AIDS/HIV

HIV is the virus that causes AIDS. It is transmitted through the blood, semen, or vaginal secretions of infected persons. It is not transmitted through casual contact. Because you can't tell if someone is HIV positive by looking at them, it is important to use latex condoms when you have sex & to avoid sharing IV drug needles/kits. If you do not know your HIV status, get tested. Treatment is available & works well at preventing progression to AIDS.

New York State Sanitary Code

BEREAVEMENT

Everyone is a unique and grieves in his own way. Understanding stages of grief can be helpful after experiencing a loss. Talking to a mental health counselor while you are grieving can also help.

Seven Stages of Grief by Elizabeth Kubler-Ross:

- **Shock-**Is unable to react at all to the loss.
- **Denial-**Mind refuses to accept the reality of the loss.
- **Anger**-Not everyone experiences anger, but it is normal if you do.
- **Bargaining**-Trying to "reason" your way out of the pain of the loss.
- **Depression**-This too is normal, and it is very easy to be stuck in this stage for a long time.
- **Testing-**Starting to find ways to move through the grief process.
- **Acceptance**-Accepting the reality of the loss and moving forward.

Breastfeeding protects babies

- 1. Early breast milk (colostrum) is "liquid gold". It is rich in nutrients and antibodies to protect your baby.
- 2. Breast milk changes as your baby grows. Colostrum changes to mature milk by the third to fifth day after birth. Mature breast milk has the right amount of fat, sugar, water, and protein to help your baby grow.
- 3. Breast milk is easier to digest than formula, especially for premature babies. The proteins in formula come from cow's milk and some babies have trouble digesting them. Pre-term, formula-fed babies have a higher risk of necrotizing enterocolitis, a serious disease that affects babies' intestines.
- 4. Breast milk fights disease. Cells, hormones, and antibodies in breast milk protect babies from illness. Breastfed babies have fewer ear infections, diarrheal illnesses &respiratory infections than formula-fed babies. Some research suggests breastfeeding reduces the risk of childhood diabetes, leukemia & atopic dermatitis (skin rash). Asthma, obesity & type 2 diabetes are less common in those who were breastfed.
- 5. Breastfeeding decreases the likelihood a baby will die of SIDS (sudden infant death syndrome).

Breastfeeding benefits mothers

- 1. It may take a little more effort than formula feeding at first, but it makes life easier in time. There are no bottles & nipples to sterilize and no measuring and mixing of formula. Breastmilk is pre-warmed and convenient for middle-of-the-night feedings.
- 2. It saves money. Formula and feeding supplies can cost over \$1,500 during a baby's first year. Because breastfed babies are sick less often, parents miss less work and health care costs are lower.
- 3. It provides opportunities for physical contact. This makes babies feel secure, warm, and comforted and requires moms to take time to relax and bond with their little ones. The skin-to-skin contact boosts mom's milk hormone levels and offers a calming effect.
- 4. It is linked to lower risks of type 2 diabetes, breast cancer, ovarian cancer and postpartum depression.

Insurance Coverage

The Medicaid Cancer Treatment Program (MCTP) is a Medicaid program for eligible persons who are found to be in need of treatment for breast, cervical, colorectal or prostate cancer (and in some cases, pre-cancerous conditions of these organs). To be enrolled in the MCTP, an individual must complete an application with a New York State Department of Health Cancer Services Program (CSP) trained designee, referred to as a Designated Qualified Entity (DQE). A DQE is a person designated and trained by the New York State Department of Health as a "Qualified" entity, for the purpose of assisting individuals to complete the MCTP application."

Technicians assist parents in the selection, installation, and adjustment of the appropriate child passenger safety seat for their child. Seats and supplies are funded through a grant from the New York State Governor's Traffic Safety Committee and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA).

Car Seat Replacement

Several problems may lead to the replacement of the safety seat. If the child is too heavy or too tall for the seat, if the seat has been in a crash, or if the seat is expired (more six years old), the technician will replace the problem seat with a new one that is compatible with the child and the vehicle in which it will be used.

How Long to Use Safety Seats

NY State law requires a child to be in a child safety seat until they are 8 years old. However, children should remain in some type of child safety seat until they are 4-foot, 9-inches tall or they reach the upper weight limit of the seat. Standard seat belts are designed for someone 5-foot, 6-inches tall with a weight of 125 pounds.

Always consult the owner's manual for your specific seat and vehicle and follow the manufacturer's recommendations.

CHILD PROTECTIVE SERVICES (Also see Abuse)

Child abuse may include the following:

- Child abuse is physical shaking, hitting, beating, burning, or biting a child.
- Child abuse is emotional constantly blaming or putting down a child; excessive yelling, shaming.
- Child abuse is sexual incest, any forced sexual activity, exposure to sexual stimulation not appropriate for the child's age.
- Child abuse is neglect a pattern of failure to provide for the child's physical needs, such as food, clothing, shelter, and medical care -a pattern of failure to provide for the child's emotional needs, such as affection, attention, and supervision.

- In NY State, the following STI's are reported to the health department: **chlamydia**, **gonorrhea**, **syphilis**, **hepatitis B**, **and HIV**.
- Every year million persons become infected with an STI.
- You can't tell by looking if a person is infected with a disease that can be passed to you during sex.
- The correct and consistent use of condoms decreases the likelihood of getting an STI.
- Condoms protect against some, but not all sexually transmitted infections.

Appendix A

Medicaid Eligibility (June 2021)

Who is eligible for New York Medicaid?

To be eligible for New York Medicaid, you must be a resident of the state of New York, a U.S. national, citizen, permanent resident, or legal alien, in need of health care/insurance assistance, whose financial situation would be characterized as low income or very low income. You must also be one of the following:

- Pregnant, or
- · Be responsible for a child 18 years of age or younger, or
- · Blind, or
- · Have a disability or a family member in your household with a disability, or
- · Be 65 years of age or older.

Tutors for Medically Fragile Children

What is BOOST?



Boost provides supplementary tutoring for children with cancer and other chronic diseases, which may prevent normal educational development. This group of

teachers will not supplant the tutoring being provided by the school, but will act as a "boost" to a child by helping him/her better understand material being presented at the child's grade level. The goal of Boost is to do all of this with the caring and warmth of an adopted grandparent. Looking out for each child's future Boost keeps an eye on each child's future. Our tutors use their teaching expertise to fill the gap left when traditional schooling is not possible. Keeping the student on-track Boost tutors make every effort to keep the student academically on track with their peers.

How does BOOST work?

Boost does not replace the tutor from the school, but works with the teacher, parent and student to provide extra help and encouragement such as:

- Communicating with the teacher as to what assistance can be provided.
- · Going to the home once or twice a week.
- . Going to the clinic to help with school work.
- Being on-call as progress is made, so that instruction is available whenever your child needs it.

Getting Started

- The Director meets one-on-one with the parents and child, so all parties can discuss the child's academic needs.
- The tutor is chosen based on the needs of the child.
- The tutor meets with the parents and child to set up a schedule and location, as well as to become acquainted with one another.
- Upon receiving permission from the parents, the tutor communicates with the school in order to coordinate services.
- The tutor meets with the child once or twice a week as long as tutoring is needed.
- Each time the tutor works with the child there must be a parent, grandparent, guardian or other responsible adult present at the location of the tutoring.

Complementing Services

Boost complements services provided by the school by helping the child:

- · Keep up with school work
- · Get back into the swing of school
- Stay at grade level

1 Why get vaccinated?

Vaccine-preventable diseases are much less common than they used to be, thanks to vaccination. But they have not gone away. Outbreaks of some of these diseases still occur across the United States. When fewer babies get vaccinated, more babies get sick.

7 childhood diseases that can be prevented by vaccines:

1. Diphtheria (the 'D' in DTaP vaccine)

- Signs and symptoms include a thick coating in the back of the throat that can make it hard to breathe.
- Diphtheria can lead to breathing problems, paralysis and heart failure.
 - About 15,000 people died each year in the U.S. from diphtheria before there was a vaccine.

Tetanus (the 'T' in DTaP vaccine; also known as Lockjaw)

- Signs and symptoms include painful tightening of the muscles, usually all over the body.
- Tetanus can lead to stiffness of the jaw that can make it difficult to open the mouth or swallow.
 - Tetanus kills about 1 person out of every 10 who get it.

3. Pertussis (the 'P' in DTaP vaccine, also known as Whooping Cough)

- Signs and symptoms include violent coughing spells that can make it hard for a baby to eat, drink, or breathe. These spells can last for several weeks.
- Pertussis can lead to pneumonia, seizures, brain damage, or death. Pertussis can be very dangerous in infants.
- Most pertussis deaths are in babies younger than 3 months of age.

4. Hib (Haemophilus influenzae type b)

- Signs and symptoms can include fever, headache, stiff neck, cough, and shortness of breath. There might not be any signs or symptoms in mild cases.
- Hib can lead to meningitis (infection of the brain and spinal cord coverings); pneumonia; infections of the ears, sinuses, blood, joints, bones, and covering of the heart; brain damage; severe swelling of the throat, making it hard to breathe; and deafness.
- Children younger than 5 years of age are at greatest risk for Hib disease.

5. Hepatitis B

- Signs and symptoms include tiredness, diarrhea and vomiting, jaundice (yellow skin or eyes), and pain in muscles, joints and stomach. But usually there are no signs or symptoms at all.
- Hepatitis B can lead to liver damage, and liver cancer. Some people develop chronic (long term) hepatitis B infection. These people might not look or feel sick, but they can infect others.
- Hepatitis B can cause liver damage and cancer in 1 child out of 4 who are chronically infected.

6. Polic

- Signs and symptoms can include flu-like illness, or there may be no signs or symptoms at all.
- Polio can lead to permanent paralysis (can't move an arm or leg, or sometimes can't breathe) and death.
 - In the 1950s, polio paralyzed more than 15,000 people every year in the U.S.

7. Pneumococcal Disease

- Signs and symptoms include fever, chills, cough, and chest pain. In infants, symptoms can also include meningitis, seizures, and sometimes rash.
- Pneumococcal disease can lead to meningitis (infection of the brain and spinal cord coverings); infections of the ears, sinuses and blood; pneumonia; deafness; and brain damage.
- About 1 out of 15 children who get pneumococcal meningitis will die from the infection.

Children usually catch these diseases from other children or adults, who might not even know they are infected. A mother infected with hepatitis B can infect her baby at birth. Tetanus enters the body through a cut or wound; it is not spread from person to person.

Vaccines that protect your baby from these seven diseases:

Vaccine	Number of doses	Recommended ages	Other information
DTaP (Diphtheria, Tetanus, Pertussis)	5	2 months, 4 months, 6 months, 15-18 months, 4-6 years	Some children get a vaccine called DT (Diphtheria & Tetanus) instead of DTaP.
Hepatitis B	3	Birth, 1-2 months, 6-18 months	
Polio	4	2 months, 4 months, 6-18 months, 4-6 years	An additional dose of polio vaccine may be recommended for travel to certain countries.
Hib (Haemophilus influenzae type b)	3 or 4	2 months, 4 months, (6 months), 12-15 months	There are several Hib vaccines. With one of them the 6-month dose is not needed.
Pneumococcal (PCV13)	4	2 months, 4 months, 6 months, 12-15 months	Older children with certain health conditions also need this vaccine.

Your healthcare provider might offer some of these vaccines as combination vaccines — several vaccines given in the same shot. Combination vaccines are as safe and effective as the individual vaccines, and can mean fewer shots for your baby.

2 Some children should not get certain vaccines

Most children can safely get all of these vaccines. But there are some exceptions:

- A child who has a mild cold or other illness on the day vaccinations are scheduled may be vaccinated. A child who is moderately or severely ill on the day of vaccinations might be asked to come back for them at a later date.
- Any child who had a life-threatening allergic reaction after getting a vaccine should not get another dose of that vaccine. Tell the person giving the vaccines if your child has ever had a severe reaction after any vaccination.
- A child who has a severe (life-threatening) allergy to a substance should not get a vaccine that contains that substance. Tell the person giving your child the vaccines if your child has any severe allergies that you are aware of.

Talk to your doctor before your child gets:

- DTaP vaccine, if your child ever had any of these reactions after a previous dose of DTaP:
- A brain or nervous system disease within 7 days,
- Non-stop crying for 3 hours or more,
- A seizure or collapse,
- A fever of over 105°F.
- PCV13 vaccine, if your child ever had a severe reaction after a dose of DTaP (or other vaccine containing diphtheria toxoid), or after a dose of PCV7, an earlier pneumococcal vaccine.

3 Risks of a Vaccine Reaction

With any medicine, including vaccines, there is a chance of side effects. These are usually mild and go away on their own. Most vaccine reactions are not serious: tenderness, redness, or swelling where the shot was given; or a mild fever. These happen soon after the shot is given and go away within a day or two. They happen with up to about half of vaccinations, depending on the vaccine.

Serious reactions are also possible but are rare.

Polio, Hepatitis B and Hib Vaccines have been associated only with mild reactions.

DTaP and Pneumococcal vaccines have also been associated with other problems:

DTaP Vaccine

- Mild Problems: Fussiness (up to 1 child in 3); tiredness or loss of appetite (up to 1 child in 10); vomiting (up to 1 child in 50); swelling of the entire arm or leg for 1-7 days (up to 1 child in 30)—usually after the 4th or 5th dose.
- Moderate Problems: Seizure (1 child in 14,000); non-stop crying for 3 hours or longer (up to 1 child in 1,000); fever over 105°F (1 child in 16,000).
- Serious problems: Long term seizures, coma, lowered consciousness, and permanent brain damage have been reported following DTaP vaccination. These reports are extremely rare.

Pneumococcal Vaccine

- Mild Problems: Drowsiness or temporary loss of appetite (about 1 child in 2 or 3); fussiness (about 8 children in 10).
- Moderate Problems: Fever over 102.2°F (about 1 child in 20).

After any vaccine:

Any medication can cause a severe allergic reaction. Such reactions from a vaccine are very rare, estimated at about 1 in a million doses, and would happen within a few minutes to a few hours after the vaccination.

As with any medicine, there is a very remote chance of a vaccine causing a serious injury or death.

What if there is a serious reaction?

What should I look for?

 Look for anything that concerns you, such as signs of a severe allergic reaction, very high fever, or unusual behavior.

Signs of a severe allergic reaction can include hives, swelling of the face and throat, and difficulty breathing. In infants, signs of an allergic reaction might also include fever, sleepiness, and disinterest in eating. In older children signs might include a fast heartbeat, dizziness, and weakness. These would usually start a few minutes to a few hours after the vaccination.

What should I do?

 If you think it is a severe allergic reaction or other emergency that can't wait, call 9-1-1 or get the person to the nearest hospital. Otherwise, call your doctor.

Afterward, the reaction should be reported to the Vaccine Adverse Event Reporting System (VAERS). Your doctor should file this report, or you can do it yourself through the VAERS web site at www.vaers.hhs.gov, or by calling 1-800-822-7967.

The National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program (VICP) is a federal program that was created to compensate people who may have been injured by certain vaccines.

OnTrackNY is an innovative treatment program for adolescents and young adults who recently have had unusual thoughts and behaviors or who have started hearing or seeing things that others don't.

Goal

OnTrackNY helps people achieve their goals for school, work, and relationships.

Eligibility

The program is for adolescents and young adults between the ages of 16 and 30 who have recently begun experiencing psychotic symptoms, such as hallucinations, unusual thoughts or beliefs, or disorganized thinking, for more than a week but less than 2 years.

Participation

OnTrackNY utilizes a "shared decision making" model and involves:

- Comprehensive care using evidence-based practices delivered by an integrated clinical team specializing in early psychosis.
- Services include psychiatric treatment, employment and educational support, substance abuse treatment, family education and support, and other services as needed.










Strong Recovery Brochure



Strong Recovery is comprised of two outpatient clinics: Chemical Dependency (SRCD), and Methadone Maintenance (SRMM). Both programs work collaboratively as one comprehensive outpatient program to bring optimal care to our patients. These programs are licensed by the New York State Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services (OASAS), and accredited by the Joint Commission.

Admission Criteria: Adults (18 years old and up) with a drug/alcohol abuse or dependence diagnosis as defined by the DSM-IV and are assessed to be capable of achieving abstinence on an outpatient level and participate in the group therapy process.

<u>Additional Criteria for Co-Occurring Disorder</u> <u>Services:</u> Patients must have an Axis I mental health diagnosis.

Additional Criteria for Methadone
Maintenance services: Verification of current
physiological dependence on Opioids for a
minimum period of 1-year.
